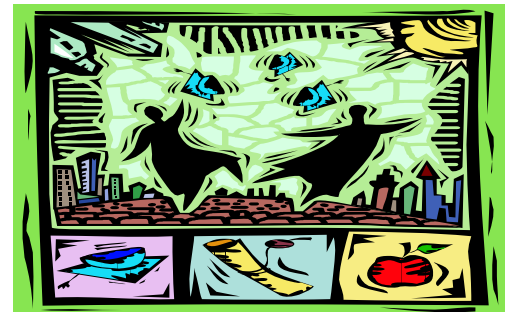
People overwhelmingly wanted the conference to be for one day with entertainment into the evening.

"Our community would like this to be a learning experience and easy for a lay person to understand."

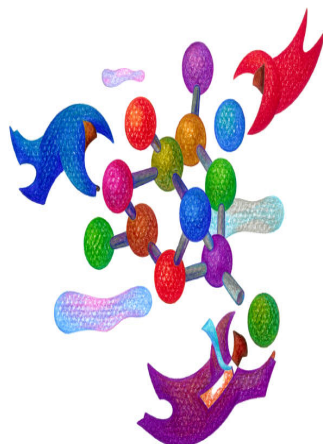

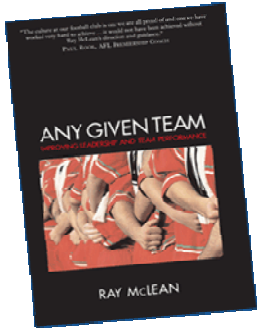

Ray McLean is a Director of Leading Teams Australia and has worked as a leadership and management consultant for the last 14 years. He also coaches and mentors a number of senior sporting executives.

Ray spent five years in the RAAF as a training and leadership officer where he redesigned the leadership and team development for the Airman Aircrew with the Maritime Patrol Group, from a theoretical course to an experiential/action learning model. He has a Bachelor of Education and taught physical education for eight years.

Ray has acquired powerful techniques and strategies that have been successfully applied by many of Australia's elite sporting teams and corporations, to develop outstanding team results.

Crossing over football codes and sports from Australian Rules Football and Rugby League to Rugby Union and Basketball, Ray McLean has worked with St George Illawarra, Adelaide Crows, The Waratahs and Sydney Swans, Sydney Kings, the Australian Basketball Teams, HSBC, Sensis, Country Fire Authority and Toyota.

Born in Dublin, Jim Stynes was brought from Ireland to Australia as part of a Ron Barrassi inspired experiment in the mid 1980's to recruit Irish footballers for the Melbourne Football Club.

He has been described as "Australia's most successful sporting experiment." His football honours include winning the 1991 Brownlow medal; Melbourne Football Club Best and Fairest in 1991, 1995,

1996 & 1997 equalling the club record.

He has also made his mark in the lives of over 450,000 Victorian young people as co-founder of Reach, a charity organisation that provides a platform for young people to support other young people.

Reach and Stynes work together to encourage teenagers to realise their potential and discover their purpose through being made to feel valued and special in a positive and supportive environment

She has delivered hundreds of training seminars and public addresses, nationally and internationally, on the subject of effective grant-seeking and grant management. Genevieve worked for the Reichstein Foundation for over ten years, after working in the community sector in Victoria for twelve years in the areas of social policy, research and community development. She has a Masters Thesis on effective grantmaking for community advocacy and social change. Genevieve is a Fellow of the Williamson Community Leadership Program, and has com-

pleted a Senior Fellowship at the Johns Hopkins International Fellows in Philanthropy Program in Baltimore, USA .

She is a warm and entertaining presenter. She is no stranger to Moorabool Shire and is well remembered by local residents for assisting them to write the proposals that got the dollars to bring their projects to life.

Ask me about.....

Not only will you have a name tag with your name and community group but you will also have an added tag that says "Ask me about....."

Feedback suggested you would like to increase your confidence in your own skills but also meet others who may be able to assist you at a later date.

The idea of these tags is to think about the skills

you may have as an individual or a group. Do you manage volunteers really well? Do you run an interesting and fun cocktail fundraiser? Do you know how to run a trivia night? Do you know how to involve young people? Did you organize an event? Do you know how to start a township committee? Do you know how to start a community newsletter? Do you know

how to keep your volunteers? Do you know how to welcome new people? Do you know how to raise money with scrap metal?

So put your thinking hats on and come up with your unique skills that others could benefit from. We look forward to hearing the stories and successes from your neck of the woods.

Situations vacant

Can you start to think of new ways of getting people involved in your group?

Current trends with volunteering tell us we need to involve people differently. You are more likely to get new people involved if it is for a time limited period. More likely it will be around specific projects like "cleaning up the river" rather than being on a Committee. Given this we are asking all groups to come up with

some ideas for short term involvement in your group.

Situations vacant

We will have a situations vacant board where you can post your requirements. Do you have a particular project to advertise.

Situations wanted

Likewise do you have skills you can offer. Maybe you can think about doing one hour a week for a group. If so put your ad up in Situations wanted.

Wanted to swap

Or perhaps you could swap some skills. Have you ever thought of asking someone to help write a funding proposal and in return provide them with a meal. Some working mums are happy to do this but are often time poor. Sometimes making a meal can buy you a few hours of a funding proposal from a semi professional grant writer!



Start to think differently about involving people in your group.

Making smart communities even smarter

There will be a number of themes in this conference. One will focus purely on funding proposals—how to write them; tips to getting it right.; networking; meeting the people who can assist. Then have a go at putting pen to paper.

Another theme will centre around volunteers and community participation. How do we get new volunteers? Did you know more people are volunteering but in dif-

ferent ways? Learn about these new ways. How can we be more creative and innovative? How do we support volunteers?

Another theme is the other "bits and pieces" that you requested. Risk management, project planning, masterplans, media savvy and more.

The fourth theme centres around creativity and connections. There are a number of exciting activities de-

signed to reinvigorate, inspire and get you thinking outside the square. Be prepared to drum, dance, paint or perform.

And when your head starts to spin have a game of bocce or carpet bowls.

It is impossible to attend all sessions so get a few of you together from your Committee or group. You can then take advantage of all there is to offer.
